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

The attack was planned and commanded by Lieutenant General John Monash, commander of the Australian Corps and Australian Imperial Force.

Veterans' Advocacy and Support Services Scoping Study

The Veterans' Advocacy and Support Services Scoping Study discussion paper is now available and the study is keen to receive submissions by 31 July 2018.

The Minister for Veterans' Affairs, the Hon Darren Chester MP, announced in April that an independent study would take place as part of the Turnbull Government's ongoing commitment to put veterans and their families first. The study also responds to concerns raised about advocacy for veterans in two parliamentary reports, including the Senate Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade References Committee report, *The Constant Battle: Suicide by Veterans*.

"Veterans and their families deserve to have the best advocacy services available to assist them to access their entitlements and this scoping study has been established to ensure that happens. The study will also consider improvements to current advocacy services which were recommended in The Constant Battle report," Mr Chester said.

The advocacy study is being led by the former Chair of the Defence Abuse Response Taskforce, Mr Robert Cornall AO. The aim of the study is to recommend a modern, professional and sustainable advocacy service for veterans and their families.

Submissions and input to the study are now being sought from the veteran, ex-service and Defence communities, including younger veterans, female veterans and veterans' families.

There will be wide ranging consultation over the next few months to prompt discussion and ideas. The study is seeking the views of relevant policy and other stakeholders, including the Veterans' Review Board, the Administrative Appeals Tribunal, and representatives from the legal, community, health and disability sectors. The study will also consider comparable overseas advocacy services for veterans.

The study has issued a discussion paper to assist organisations and individuals wanting to make a submission. It provides information and asks questions about issues raised in the study's Terms of Reference, including the contribution of ex-service organisations, different advocacy models, training and accreditation.

Two questionnaires have been developed which can be used as the basis of submissions. The first questionnaire is for organisations and individuals, including ESO members, advocates, veterans and other interested parties. These questions mirror the questions in the discussion paper. The second questionnaire is for veterans and their families who want to share their personal experiences. In both versions you can answer as many or as few of the questions as you like.

ASSISTANCE DOG TRIAL TO HELP TACKLE VETERAN MENTAL HEALTH

The Federal Government is putting veterans first with an innovative trial of assistance dogs for veterans. La Trobe University in Victoria will partner with the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) in conducting a \$2 million trial of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) assistance dogs for veterans, Minister for Veterans' Affairs Darren Chester announced recently.

"I am pleased to announce that DVA has engaged La Trobe University, in partnership with the Centre for Service and Therapy Dogs Australia, to undertake the trial of assistance dogs for veterans with PTSD as a supplement to clinical treatment," Mr Chester said.

"La Trobe is a leader in research involving our best friend and is the home to Australia's first dedicated human-dog interaction laboratory. Dogs are great company, good fun, loyal friends and anyone who has had a dog knows they can be incredibly beneficial for your wellbeing.

"The trial will be a considered process that takes into account the specific needs of the participating veteran - such as determining the most appropriate breed and temperament of dog, and the bonding process between the dog and participant."

Mr Chester said work would commence on the detailed design phase of the trial, including the process for veteran recruitment. Selection of participants will commence early in 2019, with dog or puppy selection taking place after that.

"Following the matching and suitability process, there will be a period of approximately 18 months for the initial dog training and the bonding process, prior to the placement of the dog with the participant on a permanent basis. It is expected that up to 20 participants will take part in the trial," Mr Chester said.

"Unlike pet or companion dogs, assistance dogs are specially trained to perform 'tasks' that contribute to the clinical recovery goals of the individual. The assistance dog will be integrated as part of a clinical care plan involving the veteran and their mental health clinician.

"Of course, throughout this trial, the welfare and safety of the veterans and of the dogs will be paramount."

La Trobe Deputy Vice-Chancellor Professor Keith Nugent said that the University, in consultation with DVA, veteran mental health and industry experts, will establish and apply best practice protocols to guide the training, selection and monitoring of participants and assistance dogs.

"This world-first approach to assisting people with PTSD will see our researchers working alongside industry experts in assistance-dog training. Our students and staff will also play an integral role in this process. We expect this project to make a meaningful difference to the lives of our veterans," Professor Nugent said.

Mr Chester said the assistance dog trial was just one of the new initiatives to strengthen the Turnbull Government's commitment to veterans' mental health and wellbeing.

"This trial involving DVA and La Trobe University will include consultation and the active participation of veterans through the design and delivery of this program.

"We are putting veterans and their families at the centre of everything we do, and this trial is an important tool in our efforts to support those who have served our nation in uniform."

DFRDB UPDATE JUNE 2018

After Herb posted the DFRDB [Presentation](#) on YouTube, he drew it to the attention of every MP and Senator, to which, he received just 35 responses which were not automatically generated and the majority of those stated they could do nothing because Herb did not reside in their Electorate or State.

It seems that the Government has dug in its heels and continues to consider this matter closed, with the Minister still expressing no interest in meeting with us. The Shadow Minister gives the impression that the response from Labor will not be any different and has again suggested that we stand a better chance of getting something done through legal action.

So we will now direct our efforts to that end.

At least one DFRDB recipient is already actively seeking support for a class action, despite our efforts to dissuade him. Because we have not yet established the viability of our case and because we are far from convinced that we meet the necessary criteria for a class action. Particularly, when we can only identify a small proportion of the total DFRDB recipient population. That view was reinforced during a conversation Herb had with a representative from Slater & Gordon, a well-known class action law firm.

Our view is that, when we have received advice that we have a case which stands a reasonable chance of success, any legal action should be mounted by an incorporated representative association.

Our major short term objectives now are:

To continue to build our case and to determine its viability.

Recently, we received advice from a superannuation specialist who has given us a better understanding of the issues, particularly those surrounding commutation. Advice has been received from the Defence Ombudsman that since our issue is related to policy rather than its administration, the Ombudsman's Office is unable to intervene. Legal advice based around the DFRDB [Presentation](#) has already been sought but we are still waiting for a reply.

To substantially increase the awareness of our cause.

We cannot get access to the DFRDB population's contact details from ComSuper, so we must rely on the recipients of our updates to spread the word and help us track down as many DFRDB recipients as possible. By 1:00PM on 12 June 2018, the DFRDB [Presentation](#) had been viewed just 5,223 times, after it was posted on 10 April 2018. That is less than 10% of the total DFRDB recipient population. If that is the extent of our reach and/or the level of interest, then it will be difficult to raise the necessary support and funding for any legal action.

To create a register of DFRDB recipients and their benefit details.

So far we have based the effect of the DFRDB legislation on a limited number of case studies. While these highlight the effect of the various provisions of concern, they are not a statistically valid sample of the overall DFRDB population. We have to better quantify and illustrate the effects of those provisions. Herb is working on that and establishing a web based register.

Once we have established the viability of our case, we can approach appropriately qualified legal firms to determine the cost of mounting an action. After which, we have to raise the necessary funds. We will cast the net far and wide for support.

On a related note.

A number of DFRDB recipients have expressed concerns that any gains we may achieve in DFRDB will be accompanied by a corresponding loss for those who are in receipt of a Service Pension. This is not true.

[DVA Factsheet IS87 - Income Test Overview](#) provides a fairly clear explanation but the upshot is that for every dollar gained in DFRDB only fifty cents is lost from the Service Pension.

Factsheet IS92 - Giving Away Income or Assets

Purpose

This Factsheet explains what is considered to be a gift for pension or veteran payment purposes and how giving income or assets away may affect your pension or payment. It also explains how giving away income or assets may impact on the fees and charges you may be asked to pay in residential aged care.

What is a gift?

A gift is any money or property that you give away and for which you do not receive adequate financial consideration. Gifting is the term often used when you dispose of an asset, property or income for less than its market value. It can also be called disposal or deprivation. This does not mean that you cannot give reasonable gifts to people.


The disposal can be either a transfer to another person (including a family member), private company or trust for less than market value, or it can be a gift to a person, private company or trust. An example is where you give money to friends or relatives and get nothing in return. Another example is where you sell property to friends or relatives for less than the property is actually worth.

Why does gifting affect my pension or payment?

Gifting affects your pension or payment because it either directly or indirectly reduces the assets or income available for your personal use. The gifting or deprivation provisions are intended to limit the potential for individuals to avoid the assets and income tests.

This does not mean that you cannot give reasonable gifts to people, as gifting is permissible within certain limits. Any gift made that is greater in value than the allowed limit may affect your pension or payment. The reduction in your asset value, or in your income through gifting, continues to be counted in working out the rate of your pension or payment. This means you may be assessed on assets you no longer own, or on income you no longer receive

What is a Veteran?

A "Veteran" – whether active duty, discharged, retired or reserve – is someone who at one point in his or her life wrote a blank cheque made payable to "AUSTRALIA", for an amount of "up to and including his or her life".

THE MOUSE THAT (ALMOST) ROARED

Panzerkampfwagen VIII Maus ("Mouse") was a German World War II super-heavy tank completed in late 1944. It is the heaviest fully enclosed armoured fighting vehicle ever built. Five were ordered, but only two hulls and one turret were completed before the testing grounds were captured by advancing Soviet military forces.

These two prototypes – one with, and the other without a turret – underwent trials in late 1944. The complete vehicle was 10.2 metres (33 ft 6 in) long, 3.71 metres (12 ft 2 in) wide and 3.63 metres (11.9 ft) high. Weighing 188 metric tons, the Maus's main armament was the Krupp-designed 128 mm KwK 44 L/55 gun, based on the 12.8 cm Pak 44 anti-tank field artillery piece also used in the casemate-type *Jagdtiger* tank destroyer, with a coaxial 75 mm KwK 44 L/36.5 gun. The 128 mm gun was powerful enough to destroy all Allied armoured fighting vehicles then in service, some at ranges exceeding 3,500 metres (2.2 mi).

The principal problem in the design of the *Maus* was developing an engine and drivetrain which was powerful enough to adequately propel the tank, yet small enough to fit inside it — as it was meant to use the same sort of "hybrid drive", using an internal-combustion engine to operate an electric generator to power its tracks with electric motor units, much as its Ferdinand Porsche-designed predecessors, the VK 3001 (P), VK 4501 (P), and Elefant had. The drive train was electrical, designed to provide a maximum speed of 20 kilometres per hour (12 mph) and a minimum speed of 1.5 kilometres per hour (0.93 mph). However, during actual field testing, the maximum speed achieved on hard surfaces was 13 kilometres per hour (8.1 mph) with full motor field, and by weakening the motor field to a minimum, a top speed of 22 kilometres per hour (14 mph) was achieved. The vehicle's weight made it unable to utilize most bridges, instead it was intended to ford to a depth of 2 metres (6 ft 7 in) or submerge up to a depth of 8 metres (26 ft 3 in) and use a snorkel to cross rivers.

The Maus was intended to punch holes through enemy defences in the manner of an immense "breakthrough tank", whilst taking almost no damage to any components.
